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Kesher is a peer-reviewed academic journal that publishes original research articles on the history of Jewish journalism in its various languages and studies on Jewish or Israeli media in all its forms. It also publishes historical studies on Jewish or Israeli topics that rely on media sources and examine the role of communications both as a reflection of reality and as an active agent in historical processes.
